

THE VOICE



Alleluia! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

The first and best Easter sermon was preached by Mary Magdalene (it is also the shortest): “I have seen the Lord!” There were obviously many questions, but Mary said all she needed to say in 5 words. She had seen the risen Christ and followed Jesus’ instructions to go and tell the others.

After the crucifixion, Jesus no longer teaches the disciples through his words, but only by his presence. He listens, he blesses, he asks that his sheep be fed. His resurrection is his “new” instruction. No parables, no healing, no rising other people from the dead. Only his presence. The disciples (and others) see and believe that Jesus fulfills his promises.

This theme of seeing and believing will continue throughout the rest of the book of John. The disciples see the scars and believe. They then go and tell Thomas, but he is a bit suspicious of the others. Thomas sees the scars and believes. The disciples on the road to Emmaus see and believe Jesus is the risen Lord of whom Mary spoke when he broke the bread. And then they, too, go and tell. Jesus even has a special blessing for those of us born too late to have seen, and yet believe.

Not much has changed since that first Easter morning. We are all charged to go and tell what we have seen. This is a tough thing for us Lutherans. We are not conditioned to be evangelists or missionaries. We see, we believe, and then keep silent. Going and telling is a terrifying thing for many of us.

With regards to this reluctance (or terror!), Karoline Lewis, Lutheran pastor, Luther Seminary professor, and author, asks, “Can you imagine reframing your understanding of ‘evangelism’ as invitation?....We share our relationship with Jesus or a special encounter with God not to force someone to believe in God or to have the same kind of faith as we do. Since God wants a relationship with people, they must have their own encounter with God and decide for themselves.” (*Belonging: 5 Keys to Unlock Your Potential as a Disciple*, Abingdon Press 2022, p.80) This sounds a lot less intimidating than how “evangelism” is often thought of!

Go and tell. Jesus spells it out for us in just 3 words. Go and tell of our relationship with Jesus or encounter with God as an invitation for people to find those encounters that have happened in their own lives.

Ruth Circle meets **Thursday, April 11th, at 10 a.m.** The fourth session of Scripture and Nature: Teachers of Faith is titled “Food - Daily bread for the health of the world.” Most of us hunt, harvest and forage in grocery store aisles. We've forgotten the ways our food first comes to us—from fields, flocks, forests and farms. Considering our relationship with creation and our faithful stewardship of the earth means paying attention to the ways we eat. In this final session, we'll see how stories of food in scripture offer us ways of faithful eating that are responsible, celebratory and delicious. Locust and wild honey anyone?

Then we will gather on **Thursday, May 9th, at 10 a.m.** for a closing Devotional on Mental Health and Wellness by Elise Seyfried. As long as humans have existed, there has been mental illness. By some estimates, as many as 20% of all adults live with a mental health issue. In biblical times, mental illness was often misunderstood and thought to be caused by demonic possession. In modern times, we have learned much more about brain chemistry. Although the stigma around mental illnesses has decreased, we still have a long way to go, and our faith communities can help. Looking particularly at biblical people and passages that relate to living with mental illness, this devotional reminds us of Jesus' compassionate care for those who struggle. Together, we'll learn how congregations can become “stigma-free” zones, welcome and support those with mental health issues and their loved ones and provide opportunities for all ages to learn more about a topic that affects us all.

Thank God for Our Food – *God said [to Adam and Eve], ‘See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. Genesis 1:29*

There’s a joke about the first-grade teacher who asks, “Where do apples come from?” Little Sydney speaks up: “From the supermarket!” We laugh, but the truth is, many of us forget that our food comes only from life, through the plants and animals that God alone created.

As stewards and disciples, we can develop a deep appreciation for all that God provides us, particularly our food. With every mouthful, we can thank God for our daily bread, and for the soil, air and water that sustains life. Easter and springtime are perfect occasions to celebrate God’s miracle of life that gives us fruit, vegetables, grains, meat, fish and dairy foods. Here are some ideas:

- At mealtimes grace, thank God not only for food, but also for the cycles of seedtime, growth and harvest. Thank God for life-nourishing soil, water and air.
- While eating, think about how and from where the plants are grown or animals raised? How do they get to your kitchen?
- As a church or family, celebrate Earth Day (April 22) by learning about food production and our food supply, and how environmental problems affect it.
- Celebrate Earth Day by planting a garden.
- Learn about nutrition -- what foods are the best and worst for us. Promote healthy eating.
- Learn about food waste and take steps to reduce it in your home.
- At church, celebrate creation or seedtime.

We live in a culture where food is all around us all the time. As steward-disciples, we want to be sure not to take even a mouthful for granted.

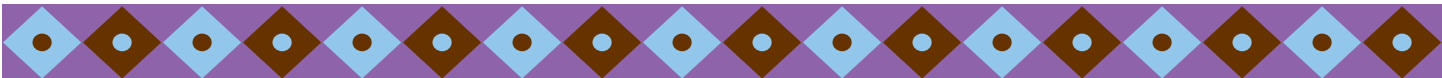
