We will let you know how many we have put together this far. Orphan Grain Train will continue to be one of our initiatives for 2023, so we will continue to gather those donations.



This quarter's Ministry Spotlight is on Loaves and Fishes. The vision for this ministry came out of the Ministerial Alliance, which is a gathering of pastors and other ministry leaders from Fremont County. In 1984 Loaves and Fishes was borne from those leaders. Seeing great need in our community, the Ministerial Alliance wished to help in a "holistic" way rather than providing necessary, but not lasting assistance. The goal

of Loaves and Fishes is to not only provide for emergencies, but to help people and families to become self-sufficient and not dependent. You could say they are trying to work themselves out of business!

In addition to the emergency assistance, Loaves and Fishes helps previously incarcerated people to find work and gain experience and new skills. They help with transportation, provide respite for people experiencing a mental health crisis which does not rise to the level of hospitalization. They also help to prevent homelessness by assisting with rent, utility bills, and offering life-skills classes like budgeting.

As you are well aware, SOTH is generous with food pantry donations and monetary gifts. This year we also encourage giving of our selves and our time. Charlene Coulson has provided a great list of ways to volunteer in this edition of The Voice. I hope you take a look at it and see if there's a "job" for you. Thank you Charlene for putting the list together! If you are interested in cooking meals, please let me know and we will try to get a team put together. 

Jesus de los Milagros' building is coming along! Your generosity has been so important to help provide a beautiful and much needed worship space for our siblings in Christ in Israel, Guatemala. Thank you!!!









Save those pop tops! Although our local McDonalds no longer accepts them, Ronald McDonald House is still collecting pop tops. Linda Miller has volunteered to make sure the collection gets to where it needs to be. The collection area remains in the coat room. Thank you Linda and all of you!

Ever wonder why we collect aluminum can pop tabs? Well, the Ronald McDonald House collects the aluminum tabs and then brings them over to a local recycling plant. There they trade the tabs in for money. As of 2022, the Pop Tab Program has generated more than \$4 million! The money goes towards facility expenses, support programs and to help sponsor programs. The foundation isn't interested in the entire can or container though. They just want the tabs, as they are more sanitary and are much easier to store in the long term. Once enough have been collected, the charity brings them to be weighed to determine their value. Then the recycling plant writes and cuts a check then and there!

The nonprofit organization is well known. They operate totally on volunteers and donations, and when you look at what Ronald McDonald House does, it makes you look beyond yourself to help somebody else. It's an amazing example of doing something so simple in order to help children in need. Ronald McDonald House Charities of Southern Colorado keeps families and their critically ill children close to each other and provides them the care and resources they need, when they need it most. When the health and well-being of a child hangs in the balance, there's no other place where their family would rather be than by their side. And, their child needs them there, too.

Contact with Lorraine at Loaves and Fishes provided abundant opportunities for volunteering for members of SOTH and to partner with Christ Episcopal as a team to accomplish the goal of hands and feet in service to others.

- 1. Cook at the emergency shelter. Brett, Emergency Shelter Director, is the contact for this option. He is available 8-4, Monday-Friday, for consultation and tours. The shelter provides the food for the meals. The menu would be your option. There is a kitchen on site that will comfortably accommodate four (4) people. Doors open at 4 and dinner is served at 6pm for clients. Cleanup would involve washing pots and pans as you go. Clients perform the remainder of the duties. After the meal there are Grab and Go meals available to others. Only residents are allowed in the dining area. Friday and Monday food is taken to residents at the New Creations Inn. Currently there are no cooks Monday, Thursday, or Friday, and one (1) on Tuesday.
- 2. 6 AM hand out food
- 3. Warehouse- Monday-Thursday, 9-1, making up food boxes from supplied goods for distribution.
- 4. Third Friday of each month, 11-2, hand out Senior (60+) boxes
- 5. Reception area-sit down opportunity-answering the phone and assisting with food bank applications. This is a come and go-your time frame.
- 6. New Creations Inn, Mike Merlino, Director, 1-719-431-1993.

God said [to Adam and Eve], 'See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food.-Genesis 1:29

There's an old joke about the first-grade teacher who asks her class, "Where do apples come from?" Little Ian speaks up: "From the supermarket!" We laugh, but the sad truth is that many of us are so far removed from farms that we forget that our food – every bite – comes from life, life that God alone created. Yes, farmers sow seeds and care for the plants and trees, but it's God's miracle of life that makes them grow.

As stewards and disciples, we desire to cultivate in ourselves and our communities a deep appreciation for all God provides us, particularly what we need to live. With every mouthful at every meal we thank God for our daily bread, and for the soil, air and water that sustain life. Easter and springtime are perfect occasions to celebrate God's miracle of life that gives us fruit, vegetables, grains, meat, fish and dairy foods.

Here are some ideas:

- Mealtime grace, thank God not only for food, but also for the cycles of seedtime, growth and harvest; for life-nourishing soil, water and air.
